



Curriculum Overview

Subject: History

Year: 9

Rationale:

- to explore twentieth-century global conflict after studying Early Modern England and the British Empire in Year 8
- to explore the impact of global politics upon the everyday lives of individuals at home and abroad
- to explore the changing role of women in the modern era
- to prepare those students opting to study GCSE History in terms of further developing historiographical skills and topic-based knowledge (e.g. Weimar and Nazi Germany)

Units of Work

1	Causes of the First World War
2	What was life like on the Western Front?
3	Was Haig the 'butcher of the Somme'?
4	The changing role of women in the 20 th Century
5	Weimar and Nazi Germany
6	Causes and Events of the Second World War

Key Knowledge development:

KS4 topics embedded throughout Year 9, alongside core History skills.

- to understand and evaluate the key causes of the First and Second World Wars
- to explore the impact of trench warfare upon soldiers
- to explore the role of political propaganda during conflict
- to explore the impact of global conflict upon the roles of women in society
- to understand the key features of the Weimar Republic and its transformation into Nazi Germany

Assessments

Teachers assess student progress via regular book marking and end-of-unit assessments, offering a range of formative and summative feedback. In addition, students engage with peer- and self-assessment. History assessment questions include:

- How far does Haig deserve to be called 'The Butcher of the Somme'?
- Propaganda source analysis – on WWI sources on changing role of women
- Interpretations: Dunkirk – Was it a Triumph or a Disaster?

Assessment questions either/or:

12 mark 'explain' GCSE question type

16 mark 'How far' GCSE question type

- Human rights – the study of the Holocaust
