






PRIMARY TRANSITION - ART WORKSHOP


YEAR 11 REVISION SESSIONS



Year 7s in Art are looking at Aboriginal Art and are beginning to design brilliant boomerangs with animals from Australia and Aboriginal symbols.








SCIENCE

Year10s were learning about homeostasis and water control dissecting a kidney in Mr Webb's Science class this week.




ASPIRATIONS


